

Location of Defibrillators in Newick

Defibrillators are available 24 hours a day and can be found in the following locations:-

Outside the main entrance to **Newick Village Hall** Western Road, BN8 4LE

Outside the main entrance to **Newick CE Primary School** Allington Road, BN8 4NB

Outside **Newick Sports Pavilion**, King George V Playing Field, Allington Road, BN8 4NA

Outside the main entrance to **Newick Health Centre** Marbles Road, BN8 4LR

The units are easy to use with illuminated instructions and a prompting audio instructor.

Newick Parish Council has taken over responsibility for monitoring and insuring the defibrillators and they are inspected on a weekly basis to ensure that they remain in good order. If you notice a problem with one of the defibrillators or if you are aware that one of them has been used in an emergency please notify the Parish Clerk immediately as replacement parts will need to be fitted.

Commemoration of WW1 Centenary

Residents of Newick will be commemorating the Centenary of the end of World War I On Remembrance Day, Sunday 11th November 2018. Please see below details of some of the events that will be taking place:

10.00 Remembrance Day Service at St Mary's Church

List of names of the fallen from Newick will be read out during the service

10.30 Procession from St Mary's Church to Memorial on The Green to include Scouts and Guides

11.00 Two minutes silence at Memorial on The Green

18.00 onwards St Mary's Church will be open for on-screen display of the Roll of Honour (all welcome to drop in)

19.00 Lighting of the Beacon on The Green (organised by Newick Bonfire Society)

Newick Bonfire Society will be making 53 torches, one for each of the fallen from Newick, and will be trying to contact their families, some of whom are still in the village, to invite them to hold a torch.

19.05 Ringing out for Peace.

Bells to be rung at St Mary's Church – part of a chain of 1000 bell towers from Chichester to Canterbury.

Local Council elections will be held on 2nd May 2019 and the eleven seats on Newick Parish Council will be up for election.

Meeting dates and agendas are published on the parish website (www.newick.net) and on notice boards around the village.

See below for some of the work that your Parish Councillors are doing already and some of the projects that will need to be progressed:-

- ◆ Managing and improving public open spaces such as The Green, King George V Playing Field, and Manwaring Robertson field,
- ◆ Maintaining and improving play areas and equipment
- ◆ Commenting on local planning applications,
- ◆ Monitoring the progress of developments and infrastructure improvements identified in Newick's Neighbourhood Plan (NB the Neighbourhood Plan will soon be going through a review to ensure that its policies remain up to date and relevant),
- ◆ Supporting local organisations through the small grant scheme
- ◆ Deciding how Newick's share of the Community Infrastructure Levy should be spent,
- ◆ Working with the Sports Pavilion Management Committee on a project to provide a brand new sports pavilion which meets modern requirements,
- ◆ Working to find a way of replacing the ageing skate park facility,

Update on Mitchelswood Farm Planning Appeal

We have informed you previously that Baroness and Mr Cumberlege have, on behalf of the village, challenged the Secretary of State's (SoS) decision to allow DLA planning permission for 50 dwellings to be built at Mitchelswood Farm. They were successful at Judicial Review and we can now report that they have also been successful in the Appeal Court. However, whilst three High Court Judges have recommended that the planning permission be quashed, the decision to finally overrule this lies back in the hands of the SoS. All of those parties who have been involved throughout this process, including the Public Inquiry in the village hall, have been invited to write to the SoS. All responses had to be in by 12th September and then all parties will have until 24th October to read and respond to all of these submissions. The SoS can take as long as he likes to make his decision and can also use any new legislation. This is a very complicated and challenging situation. We are determined as a Council to defend Newick's Neighbourhood Plan which the village overwhelmingly supported at referendum. We will update you on the situation in our next newsletter and we extend our thanks to all those Parishioners who gave support in particular the Cumberleges.



Overhanging Vegetation

Householders are responsible for making sure that their hedges, bushes and trees do not overhang or obstruct any pavements or footpaths and now, after the end of the bird nesting season, is a good time to check this.

Overgrown hedges and vegetation cause real problems for people using the footpaths and pavements, especially if they suffer from impaired vision or need a little more space for wheelchairs, mobility scooters or buggies. It can be dangerous if they are forced into the road to avoid the obstruction.

If, when you check, you find that your shrubs, hedges or trees are likely to cause a problem for passers-by please make arrangements to cut them back as soon as possible.



Litter Problem

The Parish Council has been receiving complaints about the amount of litter around our village, in particular in the bus shelter on The Green and beside the youth shelter and picnic bench at King George V Playing Field. There are litter bins provided at all of these locations, however, our village handy person has to spend a great deal of time each week picking up litter which has been dropped within feet of a litter bin. You are paying through your council tax for litter bins to be provided and emptied on a regular basis so please use them and please educate your family to understand that it is not acceptable to throw their rubbish on the ground leaving it for somebody else to pick up!
